Physical Education and Sports Funding

The government is providing additional funding for academic years 2013/14, 2014/15, 2015/16 and 2017-18 to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding- provided jointly by the Department for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport- will be allocated to primary school headteachers. (DfE 2013)



At North Stainley CE Primary School we are excited by this wonderful opportunity to enhance our PE and sports provision.

Through our rural cluster we already provide many opportunities for our pupils to compete in sporting competitions with similar schools. We also already provide opportunities for our children to take part in extra- curricular sports clubs, there is at least one per term ranging from gymnastics, to running and multi-sports. We feel these are very important opportunities and encourage all our pupils to take part. We are looking to improve these opportunities, increase participation at all levels and ensure our pupils develop a healthy lifestyle, appreciate their environment and are engaged in their learning.
